

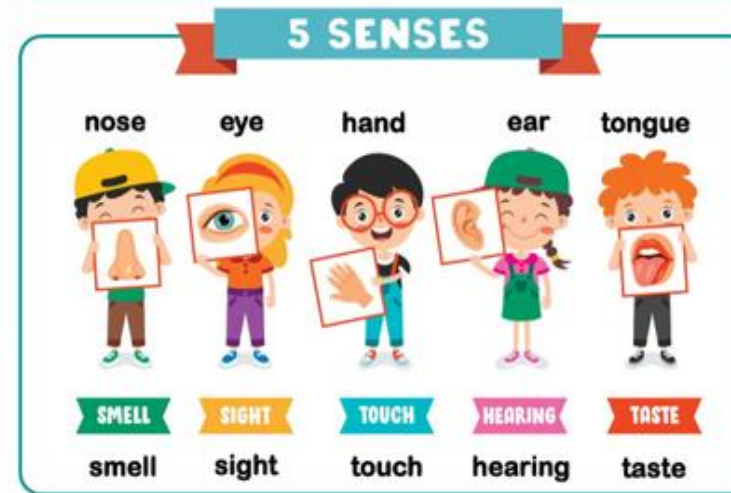
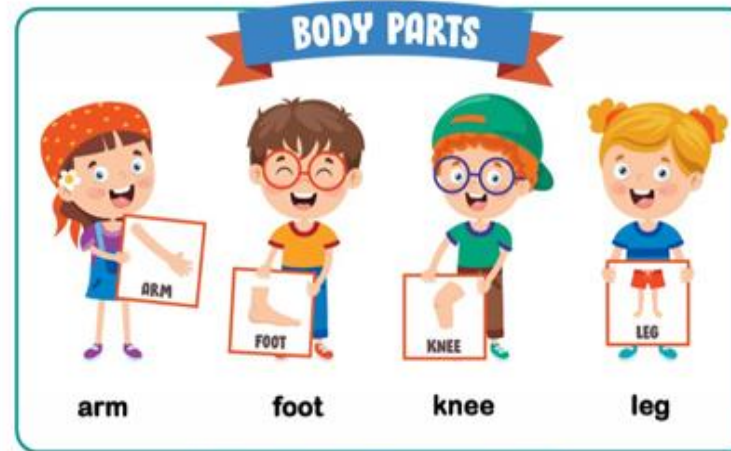
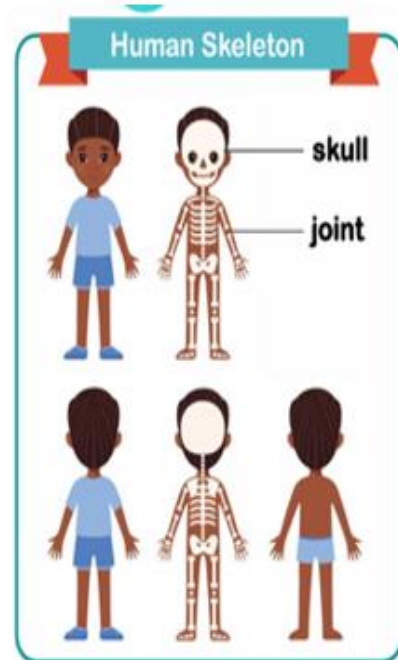

Science (Rocket) Words

Word	Meaning
Limb	An arm or a leg
Head	The top part of a human or an animal's body
Body	The whole of a human or animal, including the head, brain, heart, legs and arms
Joint	Parts of our arm or leg, such as knees and elbows, which help us to move
Skeleton	All the bones in a human or animal body
Eye	The organ of the body that allows us to see
Pupil	The black spot in the middle of the eye that lets in light, colour and shape
Eyelash	The hairs found just above your eyes
Sight	The ability to see
Touch	Use your hand, fingertips or another part of your skin to feel
Brain	Found within the skull in the head of a human or animal; it controls the whole body
Skin	The thin organ covering the whole body of a human or animal
Fingertips	The very top part of the fingers
Organ	Parts of the human body that have important jobs, such as the heart, lungs and skin

Word	Meaning
Vibration	To quickly move back and forth
Ear	The organs, or body parts, in humans and many other animals that allow them to hear
Deafness	The inability to use our ear to receive sounds
Sound	Vibrations of soundwaves that we can hear
Sign language	A way of communicating using the hands or other parts of our body
Sweet	Something that contains or tastes of sugar
Flavour	How a food tastes
Mouth	The part of the face that opens to breathe, eat and speak
Taste	The sense by which sweet, sour, bitter or salty flavours are detected through taste buds in the tongue
Tongue	The moving organ in the mouth that is used for talking, tasting, eating and licking
Odour	A smell
Smell	To sense the odour using the nose
Nose	An important body part, used for breathing and smelling
Nose hair	Tiny hairs in your nose that prevent insects, dust and pollen from entering the lungs
Nostril	Either of the outer openings of the nose through which people and many animals breathe
