





Key Vocabulary	Definition
outline	A line or shape showing the outside edge of a figure or object.
proportion	The relationship in size of two things or sets of things
collage	A type of artwork in which different kinds of materials are pasted onto a surface to make a picture. These materials can be anything from paper and photographs, to cloth and buttons.
overlap	To cover or go over part of.
montage	Any grouping of apparently unrelated images presented as a unified whole.
abstract	An artwork that is not representational but communicates through colours, marks and other visual elements.
emotion	A strong feeling such as joy, hatred, sorrow, or fear.
pattern	An arrangement of shapes, lines, letters, numbers, or colors that can be repeated or used again and again.
sketch	A drawing or painting that was done in a hurry or without detail. Sketches are sometimes done to prepare for later work.
background	The part of a picture or scene that is towards the back or seems to be furthest away.
foreground	The part of a picture or view that appears to be nearest to the person looking at it.
middle ground	The space located between the foreground and background of a drawing of painting.
