School Uniform Policy

Introduction

It is our partnership policy that all children wear school uniform when attending school, or when participating in a school-organised event outside normal school hours. We provide a complete list of the items needed for school uniform in our prospectus.

Aims and Objectives

Our policy on school uniform is based on the notion that school uniform:

- Promotes a sense of pride in the school
- Engenders a sense of community and belonging towards the school
- Is practical and smart
- Identifies the children with the school
- Prevents children from coming to school in fashion clothes that could be distracting in class
- Makes children feel equal to their peers in terms of appearance
- Is regarded as suitable wear for school and considered good value for money by most parents
- Is designed with health and safety in mind

Jewellery

On health and safety grounds we do not allow children to wear jewellery in our schools. The exceptions to this rule are watches, earring studs in pierced ears, and small objects of religious significance, such as a crucifix on a chain. Any necklaces must be worn underneath school shirts / blouses. We ask the children to remove any items of jewellery during PE and games to prevent them from causing injury.

Extreme Haircuts

The partnership does not permit children to have “extreme” haircuts, including colour, which could serve as a distraction to other children. Children with long hair are required to tie their hair up at all times, but especially for subjects such as; Swimming, P.E., Forest School, Science and Cookery, for health and safety reasons.

Footwear

The partnership wants all children to grow into healthy adults. We believe that it is dangerous for children to wear shoes that have platform soles or high heels, so we do not allow children to wear such shoes in our schools. Neither do we allow children to wear trainers in our partnership; this is because we think that this footwear is appropriate for sport or for leisurewear, but it is not in keeping with the smart appearance of school uniform. We require all children to wear shoes as stated in the uniform list.

The Role of Parents

We ask all parents who send their children to our schools to support the school uniform policy. We believe that parents have a duty to send their children to school correctly dressed and ready for their daily school work. One of the responsibilities of parents is to ensure that their child has the correct school uniform, and that it is clean and in good repair.

The partnership is all inclusive and welcomes children from all faith communities. If there are serious reasons, for example on religious grounds, why parents want their child to wear clothes that differ from the school uniform, the school will look sympathetically at such requests.

Second Hand Uniform

Both schools hold uniform sales throughout the year.

The Role of Governors

The Local Academy Committee supports the Executive Headteacher in implementing the school uniform policy. It considers all representations from parents regarding the uniform policy and liaises with the Executive Headteacher to ensure that the policy is implemented fairly and with sensitivity.

It is the governors' responsibility to ensure that the school uniform meets all regulations concerning equal opportunities. Governors ensure that the school uniform policy helps children to dress sensibly, in clothing that is hardwearing, safe and practical.

Monitoring and Review

The Local Academy Committee monitors the school uniform policy through its committee work by:

- Seeking the views of parents, to ensure that they agree with, and support the policy.
- Considering, with the Executive Headteacher, any requests from parents for individual children to have special dispensation with regard to school uniform.
- Requiring the Executive Headteacher to report to the governors on the way the school uniform policy is implemented.
